

#### **DAF Leaning Forward with PFAS Clean-up Plan**

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas -- Armed with data from nearly 10 years of investigation and response to perand polyfluoroalkyl substance, or PFAS, releases at its installations, the Department of the Air Force is rolling new regulatory standards into its ongoing plan to address PFAS risks.

"The key here is that we have a plan, and we will implement it," said Jenni Dorsey-Spitz, an environmental technical advisor to the Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Installations, Energy, and Environment. "We aren't starting from scratch. The Department of the Air Force, without a regulatory standard, leaned forward to start addressing PFAS and we will continue leaning forward with the new standard."

To date, DAF has spent more than \$2.2 billion to identify and mitigate PFAS.

The Environmental Protection Agency finalized two rules in April to classify certain PFAS compounds as hazardous substances and formally establish drinking water standards, known as maximum contaminant levels for six PFAS compounds, including levels of four parts per trillion for PFOS and PFOA, two of the common PFAS chemicals found in aqueous film forming foam, or

AFFF, previously used by the military services and civilian aviation to control petroleum fires.

Speaking at an Air Force Civil Engineer Centersponsored environmental restoration summit between DAF environmental experts and state and federal regulators in early May, Dorsey-Spitz said the established levels will help the DAF support its ability to detect and treat PFAS by finally having standards for clean-up.

"The MCL provides clear guidance on what the regulatory community considers a reasonable standard for assessing risk to human health," she said.

Since 2015, the DAF has conducted preliminary assess-

ments and site inspections at 204 installations to determine whether AFFF may have been used or released into the environment. Of those, 191 had confirmed releases of PFAS. The DAF proactively took action to mitigate risk to human health by providing alternate drinking water to impacted private well owners, funding water purveyors to install filtration systems, and taking interim response actions such as installing pump and treat systems to prevent further migration of PFAS in groundwater.

AFCEC, a primary subordinate unit of the Air Force Installation and Mission Support Center, is leading the response effort under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act to identify and mitigate PFAS impacts in the environment.

The new standards could mean more sampling of off-base drinking water supplies, Dorsey-Spitz said. Data from AFCEC's remedial investigations will help environmental project managers revise plume maps and identify drinking water sources that could be affected by PFAS at lower levels than previous sampling efforts. If the DAF identifies drinking water wells with PFAS above the action level and attributable to DoD mission activities, it may implement a response action such as connecting the residence to municipal water supply or installing filtration systems.

The DAF will also conduct quarterly sampling and replace ion exchange or Granular Activated Carbon, or GAC, systems as needed to guarantee that delivered water remains below action levels.

"There's a lot of technical work that goes on behind the scenes to make sure we have sufficient data and ensure what we put in the ground is actually going to be successful," said Dr. Shannon Garcia, AFCEC Risk Assessment subject matter expert.


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### DAF Leaning Forward with PFAS Clean-up Plan (cont'd)

"DAF continues to make great progress in executing the CERCLA process, while at the same time taking appropriate interim response actions to mitigate risk while concurrently exploring the application of new PFAS (remediation) technologies," said Dr. Mahalingam Ravichandran, AFCEC PFAS Integration Executive.

To date, DoD has invested more than \$300 million to advance technologies to expedite PFAS cleanup and to test and develop fluorine-free foams. Part of this PFAS innovation involves the removal of PFAS-containing firefighting foams from the DoD inventory and replacing them with fluorine-free foams or water-only systems. The DAF is also hosting 55 technology demonstrations at 28 installations as part of its collaboration with DoD to develop and field innovative technologies to treat PFAS in soil, water and AFFF concentrate.



Energy Assurance Campaign Plan Emphasizes Robust, Secure, Mission-ready Posture (AF CE Weekly Email Jul 2, story by Marisa Alia-Novobilski, Air Force Materiel Command Public Affairs)

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Ohio (AFNS) -- The Air Force Materiel Command released an updated Energy Assurance Campaign Plan, providing a foundation for collaboration, cooperation and innovation in all energy-related fields across the organization.

"Energy and water are essential mission resources we depend on every day," said Gen. Duke Z. Richardson, AFMC commander, in the foreword. "Events of recent years demonstrate an upward trend in environmental, physical and cyber threats to our nation's supply systems ... we need to ensure installation energy systems can provide a mission-appropriate level of energy assurance."

The EACP consists of five lines of effort in support of operationally agile and mission-protective energy systems. The LOEs are:

- Optimized Systems and Processes
- Cyber-resilient Control Systems
- Mission Matched Capabilities
- Reliable and Managed Infrastructure
- System Performance Assurance

The LOEs align to five components of resilience, which are identified as robustness, redundancy, resourcefulness, response and recovery. The campaign plan adopts Department of the Air Force standards and metrics, sets unity in approach, organizes response and heightens awareness that without a sustained investment in vital energy resources and infrastructure, missions are increasingly at risk.

"Energy assurance is mission assurance," said Capt. Timothy DeJong, Air Force Installation and Mission Support Center, Detachment 6 operations program manager. "Energy plays a vital role in everything that we do, and managing the energy portfolio appropriately, in alignment with DAF guidance, is of the utmost importance."



### Revamped Cybersecurity Course Prepares Civil Engineers for Real-World Threats

The Air Force Institute of Technology's Civil Engineer School recently revamped its Advanced Control Systems

Cybersecurity course, expanding the curriculum to include new exercises targeting wireless access points, fire alarms, traffic lights and other enhanced material supporting base critical infrastructure protection.

Before attending the course, students typically have a basic awareness that cybersecurity is important but may not fully understand its relevance to their work.

"There's a lack of understanding and awareness of the risks, threats and knowing what an attacker can do to a system, so that's really the focus of this class," said Dr. Jonathan Butts, course instructor and co-founder of QED Secure Solutions. "We provide not only awareness of what the risk and threats are but



also actionable items so when students return to their base, they can start implementing measures to secure and harden the devices and systems they support."

The five-day course provides hands-on education for civil engineers to understand the impact of cyber-attacks on control systems. Students are able to engage in various lab exercises using the Mobile Industrial Control System Security Trainer. The curriculum also introduces students to ladder logic, human-machine interfaces and basic networking principles that emulate a real-world control system. These lesson concepts are applied during a capstone exercise demonstrating how malicious code can create physical effects on control systems.

"We focused on expanding the hands-on aspects of the labs and real-world components within the class," Butts said. "We did that to provide more realistic training scenarios for the students so they can apply the principles taught in class to their home installations."

A notable addition to the course is a fully functional stoplight in the classroom, allowing students to experience real-time cybersecurity impacts.

"Students create stoplight logic and upload it to a real stoplight," said Billy Rios, course instructor and co-founder of QED Secure Solutions. "Instructors then show the hacked stoplight or what happens if the coding wasn't done right or wasn't secure. This helps students conceptualize the cyber-to-physical world relationship."

Following the hands-on exercises, students complete an incident response exercise, creating plans for defending against and responding to cyber threats at their base. A new capstone group project, derived from a real-world event, tasks students with evaluating a fire suppression system for vulnerabilities an attacker could exploit. They then develop a plan to counter the system's weaknesses, implement and demonstrate the attack, and trigger the fire suppression alarm.

Instructors include case studies of real-world events to help the students apply their learning. One case study involves assessing vulnerabilities in an electric power grid.

"We walk students through evaluating the cyber vulnerabilities of a real-world example, showing how an adversary can attack military and commercial systems, potentially impacting the mission," Butts said.

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#### Revamped Cybersecurity Course Prepares Civil Engineers for Real-World Threats (cont'd)

Staff Sgt. Jeremy Vasquez from Air Force Strategic Operations Command at Hurlburt Field, Florida, said, "Coming to this course has definitely opened up my eyes to issues that can occur at my home station and the importance of securing systems and networks."

At first I was very apprehensive about taking this class because it is definitely outside of my skill set," said Staff Sgt. Jesse Burton, from Air Combat Command at Mountain Home Air Force Base, Idaho. "But I've been surprised at how quickly I've picked it up. The instructors do a great job of relating this to my job. I can definitely see the need for this class now."

Instructors have noted that students often are unaware of the resources available to them for mitigating cybersecurity attacks. As more systems are automated to save personnel and money, the threat for cyber-attacks increases, especially in deployed locations.

"This course gives us an opportunity to educate them that there are personnel assigned to their respective installations who handle many cybersecurity responsibilities," said Nicholas Kulesza, course director for the CE School. "This helps reduce response time if they encounter a cyber incident or event."

The course has been offered 17 times, and at least one student has contacted the instructors with a concern at their base.

"We connected the student with the Air Force Civil Engineer Center, which took proactive measures on the issue," Kulesza said. "It was a pleasant surprise to see the student quickly applying the knowledge from the course."



The course is required for 7-level technicians from electrical, power production, HVAC/R, water and fuels Air Force Specialty Codes and must be complete for promotion to technical sergeant.

"Our primary target audience is staff sergeants," Kulesza said. "We have also seen rising demand from civilians who are responsible for the continued operations of control systems."

Students praised the expertise and helpfulness of the faculty.

"I feel confident asking questions about any of this information, knowing the instructors will have the knowledge or resources to help," Vasquez said.

"The instructors have done a great job of bringing in people like me, with zero experience, and making me feel capable of doing this," Burton said.
